The Board took a lunch break from 12:10 - 1:10 p.m. Ms. Mitchell called the meeting back to order at 1:15 p.m.

IV. <u>Action Item</u>

A. Approval of Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) Funding Recommendations for Fiscal Year 2004

Ms. Cindy Sherwood-Green stated that a team of 10 readers reviewed all of the proposals. Readers were given a standardized tool that was utilized during the deliberations.

Safety Net Services Funds

A question was raised as to why was St. John's Shelter was funded so modestly. Mr. Bonanno replied that this is first-time funding and because there is no history with funding this program, SETA would like to move ahead cautiously.

Mr. Albright suggested that the funds allocated to Paratransit be eliminated and distributed to the other programs.

Moved/Albright, second/Lehman, to reduce Francis House by \$5,000, reduce Greater Sacramento Urban League by \$10,000, reduce MCA by \$2,000 and increase the Galt Concilio by \$15,000 and Traveler's Aide by \$2,000, and bring this portion to 1/3 of the available funding. Funds will be identified later in the meeting.

Ms. Mitchell stated that there has always been a shortage of programs submitting proposals for the north area.

Substitute motion: Moved/Healey, second/Mills, to accept staff funding recommendations for Safety Net Programs with no changes in the funding recommendations.

Roll Call Vote: Aye: 4 (Anderson, Bettis, Healey, Mills), Nay: 7. Motion Failed.

Vote on the original motion: Roll Call Vote: Aye: 7, Nay 4 (Bettis, Healey, Mills, Mitchell). Motion passed.

Family Self Sufficiency Funds:

Barbara Lehman discussed funding for Visions Unlimited. In addition, Ms. Lehman asked that there be some verification of program collaboration provided during the funding cycle to ensure there actually is collaboration among the program operators.

Mr. Albright left at 3:25 p.m.

Mr. Healey asked that for future funding processes, the programs be required to identify that they DO collaborations and what steps will they do throughout the year to increase funding through other areas. It is crucial for programs to have funding from other sources than SETA. Ms. Anderson wants to ensure that the school districts are 'pulling their weight' with regard to funding and services provided.

Moved/Lehman, second/Bales, to move \$5,000 from Cottage Housing in Family Self-Sufficiency and transfer the funds to Safety Net Services, adopt staff recommendation as recommended with inclusion of mechanism on how the programs are leveraging program funds.

Ms. Anderson stated that if the board took the funds from Elk Grove, it would force them to look elsewhere for funds. By making people look for funding elsewhere, it would not be as much as a shock to them when they do not get funding. Ms Anderson feels that there should be a timeframe for programs to move on from being reliant on CSBG funding.

When asked why the City of Sacramento Parks and Recreations dementia program scored low, Ms. Sherwood-Green stated that the City did not include a description for their case management programs. This is an education program, offering 8-week education programs for the caregivers.

Amendment to the Motion: Moved/Bettis, second/Lehman, to accept staff recommendations, and take \$30,000 from Elk Grove and move it to the City Parks & Rec. dementia program, and take \$5,000 from Sacramento Cottage Housing and move it to Safety Net Services

Moved/Reese, second/Lehman, add \$5,000 to the Galt Concilio for Safety Net Services.

I. <u>Call to Order/Roll Call</u>: Ms. Mitchell called the meeting to order as a Committee of the Whole at 10:04 a.m.

II. Consent Item

A. Approval of Minutes of the October 29, 2003 Special Meeting: No action taken due to no quorum present.

III. Action Item

A. Approval of WIND Youth Center's Request to Change its 2004 Community Services Block Grant Contract from Family Self-Sufficiency to Safety-Net

Ms. Cindy Sherwood Green stated that there might be a procurement issue with this item. Staff is requesting that the board authorize this modification pending state approval.

Ms. Purdy stated that staff is requesting that the CAB hear the item and that a determination be made that the CAB move this program to Safety Net from Family Self-sufficiency. If so, staff would go to the state and ask for a change in our procurement policy. Ms. Purdy explained the procurement process. WIND Youth Center submitted a proposal for Family Self-Sufficiency only. However, staff thought that the program would have more success under Safety Net. Family Self-sufficiency would not be the best activity since there is a requirement of ongoing case management and tracking the progress of a client. This would

set WIND up for a poor evaluation since the kids tend to be very transitory. The whole idea behind Safety Net is emergency services which is specifically what WIND does.

Mr. Bales inquired why this modification was done in 1998 and not allowed now. Ms. Purdy replied that when it was identified as a problem, WIND requested a change in funding categories and this was allowed. This time the modification is being recommended as a way to prevent WIND from having negative evaluations.

Ms. Sherwood-Green discussed the history of WIND and the reporting requirements. She suggested that they move to Safety Net and they were successful. WIND wants to continue serving this population and staff does not want the reporting requirements prevent them from having a good monitoring report. WIND has a good case management system in place but the kids are transient.

Mr. Bob Ekstrom, WIND Youth Center, stated that the program has case management services, particularly through the shelter. There are a number of kids that come to them for crisis services and it would be easier to demonstrate provision of service and a wider use of the money if WIND were allowed to move into Safety Net services.

Ms. Sherwood-Green stated that in the RFP, a certain amount of dollars were set aside for Safety Net and this would change if the move was approved. If it is approved, it would change it by 2%.

Mr. Ekstrom stated that there is a way to justify the lower numbers if they are funded under Family Self-sufficiency. It can be explained that the kids that they service are very transitory. They will keep track of the services provided under Family Self-sufficiency and later justify the lower numbers if needed.

Mr. Healey stated that this is a scenario that will make it easier for the agency to do business and provide services. This should not be a problem for the WIND to figure out ...they should just do the job of providing services to kids.

Ms. Sherwood-Green stated that in 2003, WIND was very successful in their Safety Net component. Under Family Self-sufficiency, it may be more difficult to have the same rate of success because there are different expectations for the program to achieve.

Mr. Ekstrom stated that doing the program under Family Self-sufficiency will be more of a challenge but is doable. Their numbers may be lower. They will continue to provide Safety Net services to the kids. Moved/Healey, second/Bales, to approve, as a committee of the whole, moving WIND funding from Family Self-Sufficiency to Safety Net. This approval is contingent upon receiving state approval.

Ms. Purdy stated that if the state denies our request, WIND will be held to the requirements for Family self-sufficiency for which they contracted. Either way, the program will remain funded.

Ms. Anderson inquired what is the difficulty in working with WIND to get the feedback and other groups that they partner with. Mr. Ekstrom stated that they have done a significant amount of work in tracking the cases. It is more the reality of the population and the fact that the kids are difficult to track.

Mr. Healy stated that there is an assumption that there are other programs providing these services. A lot of other programs are already impacted with services and as much as Foodlink wants to do expansion, it is a struggle to keep the doors open. It's more difficult to do collaborations with budgets being stretched so tightly.

Ms. Purdy and Ms. Sherwood-Green will be presenting an item to the board to look at the Family Self-sufficiency component and consideration to modify this category. The board will be asked what services are important and where should we put our funds in the future. Family self-sufficiency is important but there are a lot of people falling through the cracks. There has been a tremendous need for emergency services.

Vote on the motion: Unanimous approval of the committee of the whole.

ITEM III - A - ACTION

APPROVAL OF COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT CONTRACT EXTENSIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2005

BACKGROUND:

SETA's Delegate Agreement with Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funded program operators permits SETA to extend the term of each agreement for an additional year. The term of the existing Delegate Agreement ends on December 31, 2004.

SETA's Planning, Monitoring, and Fiscal staff have conducted a thorough evaluation of CSBG program operator performance through September 30, 2004. Staff has determined that all CSBG program operators have been performing satisfactory, with most meeting or exceeding outcome goals and/or service levels as prescribed in their Delegate Agreements. Conditions causing some program operators to perform below prescribed service and expenditure levels have been evaluated and corrective actions taken. Staff recommends extending all CSBG Delegate Agreements for an additional year under the same terms, conditions, and funding amounts as indicated on the attached charts. In addition, staff recommends maintaining the consultant services of Daren Maeda, Director of Linkage to Education, for the same funding level allocated in Fiscal Year 2004, \$30,000.

The SETA Governing Board will consider this item at its November 18, 2004 meeting.

Staff will be available to answer questions.

RECOMMENTATION

Approve staff recommended contract extensions for all CSBG program operators for the 2005 Fiscal year and maintain Daren Maeda as a SETA consultant for an additional year as listed on the attached chart.

It is anticipated that MCA will meet its contracted goals by December 31, 2004.
St John's Shelter	As a new CSBG provider in 2004, St. John's Shelter experienced a late program start-up due to contract issues and submitted several late programmatic and fiscal reports. St. John's Shelter has demonstrated its commitment to improve its reporting process and is now current with all reports.
Travelers Aid Society of Sacramento, Inc.	Expenditures are somewhat below plan as of September 30, 2004. As need for services increases during the holiday season, program staff anticipate 100% expenditure by December 31, 2004.
Voluntary Legal Services of Northern California	Voluntary Legal Services of Northern California has continued to provide all contracted services to the targeted population and comply with federal, state, and local requirements.

- (2) Backup documents for the participant workshop (check #9302) were not available for review during the fiscal visit. The subgrantee's accountant is aware of the problem and agreed to contact the vendor/service provider for the invoice.

Recommendation:

- (1) Invoices, timesheets, backup documents and cost allocation worksheets needed to be properly maintained to support the expenditures charged to the SETA funded contracts. The lack of proper documentation may result in questioned costs in future audit.

- The total costs as reported to SETA from September 30, 2002 to September 29, 2003 for Head Start and from January 1, 2003 to December 31, 2003 for CSBG have been traced to the delegate agency's records. The records were verified and appeared to be in order.
- 2) MCA over-reported expenditures by \$424.91 due to an error in the payment of a vendor's invoice.
- Based on unaudited Profit and Loss statement, MCA incurred an operating loss of \$ 13,631.93 from January 1 to December 31, 2003. The Balance Sheet as of December 31, 2003 shows total current assets of \$ 118,537.39 and current liabilities of \$ 226,935.77. The current liabilities exceeded the current assets by \$ 108,398.38 primarily due to the loan with Wells Fargo which has a balance of \$ 93,772.95 as of December 31, 2003.
- 4) On September 12, 2003, MCA filed a claim against the Non-Profit Directors and Officer's Insurance policy for \$100,000. In the claim, MCA indicated that the organization incurred a loss in September, 2000 due to the action of the then Program Manager, who extended the Head Start school year by a month resulting in unbudgeted expenses which were not reimbursed. This caused MCA to maximize its \$100,000 credit line with Wells Fargo. Please provide SETA with information on the result of this claim filed with your insurance company.
- 5) MCA conducted fund raising activities last year and the funds raised helped the organization to keep up with the interest payments on the loan but not enough to substantially pay down the loan principal. The negative current ratio of almost 2 to 1 (\$2 current liabilities for every \$1 of current asset) as of December 31, 2003 indicates an urgent need to raise funds to reverse this trend . Please provide SETA with your fund raising plans for the current year.

Recommendations for Corrective Action:

- 1) Reimburse SETA \$424.91 from non-SETA funds and adjust your records.
