4. <u>ACTION ITEM:</u> Approval to Release a Request for Proposal for the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity (WIOA) Title I, Youth Program Services for program years 2023-2027

Ms. Mechals reviewed the item. She shared feedback from the committee and community discussions with youth about the interest in having increased flexibility and innovation regarding service delivery and program design, increased access to services and high-need areas, developing diverse work-based learning opportunities and industry-sector partnerships, as well as earn-and-grow opportunities (including pre-apprenticeships and apprenticeships), alignment of initiatives, such as public service pathways, digital equity, inclusion, Aggie Square, Climate Action, Future of Work, California Apprenticeship Initiative. Additionally, provide leadership opportunities for use to serve on the Youth Committee. She stated that this is a specific focus that we would like to partner with the youth providers on.

Mr. Gordon asked how we put it out in a way that highlights the interest and obtains proposals.

Ms. Mechals replied that the Request for Proposals is broad enough for providers to look at their programming and evolving changes in the last four years (caused by COVID, changes with virtual services, etc.). She advised that the intent is for providers to have freedom and flexibility to come up with the type of paths that they want to focus on and that this Request for Proposals will guide them in the right direction.

Mr. Cunningham suggested the bidders' conference.

Ms. White advised being more strategic with the nonprofits that haven't been involved yet by quantifying expected outcomes.

Mr. Cunningham suggested reaching out to Uptown Studios PR company.

Ms. Mechals and Ms. Hernandez described the bidders' conference to Ms. Hutchinson, per her request.

Ms. Gordon stated that media consultants could help promote this Request for Proposals to the public.

Mr. Kim commented that SETA has a fairly robust distribution list that includes many different nonprofits, community-based organizations, and other partners. The RFP will be sent to the entire list if approved.

Ms. Kay Stephens advised that The Impact Foundry might generate leads to newer nonprofits serving the community and the Governing Board bodies through their economic development program.

Technical suggestions were added about RFP formatting by Ms. Kay Stephens as well.

Mr. Louie stated that current providers need to be shown how this particular RFP may differ from the services they are already providing. He advised supporting ongoing service providers.

ITEM 3 - ACTION

APPROVAL OF FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE WORKFORCE INNOVATION AND OPPORTUNITY ACT (WIOA), TITLE I, YOUTH PROGRAM, FOR PROGRAM YEAR 2023-2024

BACKGROUND:

In November 2022, the Sacramento Works, Inc. Youth Committee began the planning and public input process for developing a Request for Proposals (RFP) to procure the WIOA Youth Program Services for program years 2023-2027.

Based on committee discussions, and community and youth input, the WIOA Youth Program RFP focused on the following:

- Increased flexibility and innovation in service delivery/program design
- Access to services in high need areas
- Develop diverse work-based learning opportunities and industry sector partnerships
- Provide Earn & Learn opportunities including pre-apprenticeships and apprenticeships
- Alignment of Initiatives such as Public Service Pathways, Digital Equity and Inclusion, Aggie Square, Climate Action, Future of Work, California Apprenticeship Initiative

The SETA Governing Board approved the release of the WIOA Youth Services RFP on February 2, 2023. On February 3, 2023, the RFP was released to the public with a proposal deadline of March 23, 2023. Seventeen (17) proposals were received by the deadline.

Selection/Evaluation Procedure/Criteria

A proposal Evaluation team comprised of staff, partners, and Youth Committee members evaluated and scored each proposal. Staff assigned performance points based on past program performance, then ranked all proposals by total score and developed funding recommendations.

Proposal evaluation criteria included program summary, target area, target group, program design, performance benchmarks, statement of capabilities/references, financial management and budget. Total proposal points possible were 100.

All applicants who are either current or recent SETA-funded program operators were evaluated based upon their ability to meet contractual performance standards for up to the last three fiscal years. Other organizations not currently or previously funded by SETA, and service providers who received SETA funds prior to 2017, were evaluated based on information obtained from references submitted in their proposal. Total performance points possible were 40.

A summary of Youth Program performance is included as an attachment.

FUNDING ALLOCATIONS

SETA has not received its WIOA Youth allocations for Py2023-2024, and the total youth funding estimated to be available for allocation for PY 2023-2024 is \$2,600.000. The remaining funds are allocated to program administration, support, monitoring and fiscal management. Additionally, the funding recommendation includes an allocation of \$50,000 to support the Youth Committee and Sacramento Works Board initiative to increase the youth voice on the Board.

The Sacramento WIOA youth funds are allocated in two categories: Individualized Services for In-School Youth and Individualized Services for Out-of-School Youth.

<u>Individualized Services:</u>

The WIOA identifies specific program elements to be incorporated into the delivery of youth services.

- 1. Secondary School Completion Services
- 2. Alternative Secondary School Services
- 3. Paid or unpaid work experience that have academic and occupation education as a component of the work experience

- 4. Occupational Skills Training that lead to recognized post-secondary credentials that align with in-demand industry occupations
- 5. Education offered concurrently with and in the same context as workforce activities and training for a specific occupation
- 6. Leadership development opportunities, including community service and peer-centered activities encouraging responsibility and other positive and civic behaviors
- 7. Supportive Services
- Adult Mentoring
- 9. Comprehensive Guidance and Counseling
- 10. Follow-up Services for not less than 12 months after program completion
- 11. Financial literacy education
- 12. Entrepreneurial skills training
- 13. Career awareness, career counseling and career exploration services about in-demand industry sectors/occupations
- 14. Activities that help youth prepare for and transition to post-secondary education and training.

The WIOA Youth Program requires that these elements be part of a comprehensive and community-focused program design providing an age continuum of services to the target population. Program services will address the barriers of the targeted youth and prepare them to obtain employment in a high wage/high growth industry or in an occupation with future career advancement opportunity, enter an education or training program, attain a degree/certificate, achieve measureable skill gains or return to/remain in secondary/alternative secondary school.

ITEM 4 - ACTION

APPROVAL OF YOUTH COMMITTEE INITIATIVE TO INCREASE YOUTH VOICE

The Youth Subcommittee solidified a plan to engage youth in all Sacramento Works activities, including the Youth Committee.

In February 2023, SETA staff developed marketing tools and an application process as well as promoted the opportunity to the youth providers during the Provider training. The application opened on 3/8/23. The marketing materials are attached and application is available on the SETA website: https://sacramentoworks.org/youth/youth-voice-member/.

Action Plan:

- 1. Prioritize the need to pay youth for taking on a leadership role.
- 2. Focus on engaging younger individuals, 16-24 to help with program design, community outreach, and committee planning of activities.
- 3. Provide youth voice and expertise, power, and share in decision-making with adults.
- 4. Redesign the Youth Committee Application. The paid work-based learning opportunity Job Description will include the application link.
- 5. Compensate youth for time worked at minimum wage (\$15.50) for approximately 10 hours per month. Community College Foundation will be the employer of record.
- 6. Goal is to provide 10 work-based learning opportunities.
- 7. Fund from WIOA Youth Committee Initiatives \$50.000

As of 5/1/23, there are two individuals that are interested in a position. SETA plans to provide an Orientation in May 2023, then handle all the onboarding requirements and basic training. The Youth Subcommittee members will be asked to meet with Youth Voice applicants (via Zoom) to provide an introduction and overview on what it means to serve on a committee. A subcommittee meeting will be scheduled for May to plan how to onboard and train youth.

The following members have expressed interest in participating in the initial phase of the initiative: Brandon Louie, Tina Reynolds, and Randi Kay Stephens.

Staff will be available to answer questions.
