V. Information Items

- A. Report on American Express Corporate Account Rewards Points Program as of December 31, 2020
 - Ms. Saurbourne reviewed the report as of December 31, 2020. Mr. Nottoli inquired as to what will 4.5 million points get SETA? Ms. Saurbourne replied that the exchange rate is .08 cents per point which is a few thousand dollars; we generally exchange the points for computers or staff appreciation items.
- B. Fiscal Monitoring Reports: No questions.
- C. Employer Success Stories and Activity Report: No questions.
- D. Dislocated Worker Update: No questions.
- E. Head Start Reports: Ms. Denise Lee is excited to share that the first of 40 Head Start centers opened on Monday. About half of the families for the infant/toddler classrooms have a desire to return to in-person services but preschool classrooms are filling quickly. Phoenix Park opens next Monday and an additional center will open weekly thereafter. Ms. Lee stated that it is important to make sure there are enough staff to fill in-person services and still continue remote learning for those interested. Ms. Lee asked members to spread the word about vacant enrollment slots in Head Start and Early Head Start. SETA is working with community partners to get timely information on providing vaccines for those staff interested.
 - Mr. Guerra asked if there were a percentage of child care/early learning staff getting vaccinated? Ms. Lee replied that staff is working to compile the information. As staff receive their vaccinations, the department is requesting them to submit the proof of their second shot. We are not requiring vaccines at this time but we are asking for documentation to track the information. Mr. Guerra stated that his office is working with the Counsel General of Mexico to notify people of vaccine availability. The goal is to get all childcare providers to receive the vaccine; this is important to assist everyone to re-enter the workforce.

- B. Executive Director: Ms. Kossick announced that Ms. Wendy Tanner will be serving as Clerk of the Boards until mid-May; board members will be hearing from Ms. Tanner regularly. Ms. Kossick stated that for the safety of staff and customers, SETA has updated our Illness and Injury Prevention Plan, a document required by Cal/OSHA and created a COVID-19 Prevention and Response Program. The Human Resources Department is walking all sites prior to reopening to ensure compliance with Cal/OSHA. Ms. Noren is working on a plan to ensure staff safety during reopening of centers. Staff is being trained on

safety practices for staff and teachers in Head Start. The Franklin and Hillsdale career centers have been opened for in-person services. Remote services were provided earlier but now appointments are available.

ITEM II-B CONSENT

APPROVAL OF AN APPOINTMENT TO THE SACRAMENTO WORKS BOARD

BACKGROUND:

The local Sacramento Works Workforce Development Board was newly formed in early 2016 to comply with the 2014 Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act(WIOA). As part of its action on February 4, 2016, the SETA Governing Board satisfied the desire for a smaller Workforce Development Board by setting the size of the Board at twenty-five members and allocated the twenty-five membership positions to the five membership categories in the following manner: Thirteen members were allocated to business (a majority of the membership); four members were allocated to Labor and Apprenticeship (at least 15% of the membership); six members were allocated to specific programs in the workforce system (community based organizations, Adult Education, Higher Education, Economic Development, Wagner-Peyser (EDD) and Vocational Rehabilitation); and two members were allocated to the "Other" category permitted by WIOA to provide the Governing Board with flexibility in appointing members in this catch-all category.

On March 3, 2016 the Governing Board appointed twenty-five members to the newly formed Sacramento Works Workforce Development Board. The Board had staggered initial terms of two, three or four years. Extended terms from that time are a three-year term. In 2020 the request was made to add an additional economic development seat, which required adding another private business seat to keep the majority of the board representing the business community, as required in the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act. The Sacramento Works Board considered the request to increase the board size by two and took action at its meeting on May 27, 2020 to increase the board size to 27. The current bylaws of the Sacramento Works, Inc. allow up to thirty board members.

Staff recently received a resignation from Ms. Amanda Taylor from the Associated General Contractors of California. The Board Development Committee of the Sacramento Works Board recently recruited a private business nominee for the vacant slot. Historically, the Executive Committee of Sacramento Works has recommended the name(s) of individual applicants for appointment to the private sector seats by the SETA Governing Board. The Sacramento Works Executive Committee met on March 22, 2021 and is forwarding Ms. Amanda Higley's application for the Private Business slot with a recommendation for appointment. The applications for Ms. Higley is being sent under separate cover.

ITEM III-A -1 ACTION

APPROVAL TO EXTEND AUDIT SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2021 AND AUTHORIZE THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR TO SIGN THE AGREEMENT

BACKGROUND:

On April 30, 2020, the SETA Governing Board approved the selection of Eide Bailly to provide audit services for one year with the option of extending the agreement for two additional one-year terms. The audit fee for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020 was \$47,000 which included the single audit for two major federal programs. Additionally, the current agreement includes a provision for additional major program audits, if required, at an additional cost of \$4,000 each. The agreement allows for an increase of 5% or the Consumer Price Index, whichever is smaller. The Consumer Price Index increased by 1.4% during 2020.

Staff is recommending extending the agreement for audit services in the amount of \$47,658 (\$47,000 x 1.014%) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, plus \$4,000 for any additional major program audits should Eide Bailly determine that SETA is required to be audited for an additional federal program.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the extension of the agreement with Eide Bailly for audit services for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021, for a total amount up to \$47,658 for two major federal programs, plus \$4,000 for any additional major program audits if required, and authorize the Executive Director to sign the agreement.

SACRAMENTO—ROSEVILLE—ARDEN-ARCADE METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA (MSA) (EL DORADO, PLACER, SACRAMENTO, AND YOLO COUNTIES) Total wage and salary jobs drop 8,900 over the month; 60,000 over the year

The unemployment rate in the Sacramento--Roseville--Arden-Arcade MSA was 7.6 percent in January 2021, unchanged from a revised 7.6 percent in December 2020, and above the year-ago estimate of 4.0 percent. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 9.2 percent for California and 6.8 percent for the nation during the same period. The unemployment rate was 6.9 percent in El Dorado County, 6.0 percent in Placer County, 8.1 percent in Sacramento County, and 7.0 percent in Yolo County.

<u>NOTE</u>: Labor Force and Industry data contained in this release differ from previous information due to the U.S. Department of Labor's annual revision process.

Between December 2020 and January 2021, combined employment in the counties of El Dorado, Placer, Sacramento, and Yolo, decreased by 8,900 to total 972,900 jobs.

- Trade, transportation, and utilities lost 5,600 jobs in January, after adding 11,000 jobs in December. Over the month, employment declined in retail trade (down 3,900 jobs) and transportation, warehousing, and utilities (down 1,700 jobs).
- Leisure and hospitality (down 1,600 jobs) continued to decline from December to January.
- Professional and business services reported a month-over drop of 1,500 jobs. Within the industry, job losses occurred in administrative and support and waste services (down 1,000 jobs) and professional, scientific, and technical services (down 600 jobs).
- On the upside, education and health services reported a gain of 3,900 jobs. Job additions
 were in health care and social assistance (up 4,200 jobs). Educational services cut back 300
 jobs.

Between January 2020 and January 2021, total jobs in the region decreased by 60,000 or 5.8 percent.

- Leisure and hospitality led year-over decline for the region, shedding 32,700 jobs.
 Accommodation and food serviced dropped 24,300 jobs. Arts, entertainment, and recreation reduced by 8,400 jobs.
- Other services fell by 9,000 jobs since last January.
- Government lost 8,600 jobs. Job declines were in local government (down 8,700 jobs) and state government (down 200 jobs). Meanwhile, federal government added 300 jobs.
- Construction (up 3,500 jobs) and trade, transportation, and utilities (up 1,100 jobs) were the only major industry sectors to experience year-over job gains.



Head Start, Early Head Start and EHS-CCP

All under-enrolled programs, SETA and delegate agencies:

Center Re-Opening Update

The SETA operated program began its gradual re-opening process on March 1st, starting with the Norma Johnson Early Learning Center (ELC).

With limited capacity in each classroom, the Norma Johnson ELC re-opened with 13 preschool children and 4 toddlers. This represents full capacity for the preschool room and 50% capacity in the Early Head Start classroom under COVID-19 guidelines. In general, many EHS families are interested in remaining in distance learning for the time being. Enrollment staff have been reaching out to families enrolled at other nearby centers to see if they would like to attend in-person services at Norma Johnson ELC until their assigned center is scheduled to re-open. As future vacancies occur for in-person services, families will be called in priority order including, but not limited to, working families, high-risk circumstances, children with disabilities, 4 year-old children, three-year old children, other family needs, and families in nearby centers that are not scheduled to re-open prior to the summer. Families may elect to remain in distance learning services.

The re-opening schedule for the SETA Operated Centers is provided below. Traditional school centers not listed here are scheduled to return to in-person services on August 9th, including Alder Grove Preschool, Bright Beginnings, Franklin, Fruitridge, Grizzly Hollow, Illa Collin, Kennedy Estates, Nedra Court, Solid Foundations and Walnut Grove.

UPDATE FROM THE OFFICE OF HEAD START

ACF-PI-HS-21-01 - FY 2021 Head Start Funding Increase Issued on: February 19, 2021

This Program Instruction (PI) provides information about the FY 2021 Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA), quality improvement funding for Migrant and Seasonal grantees, and the supplemental funds available to support grantees' continued response to COVID-19. It makes brief mention of the application requirements, but more details will be forthcoming.

COLA - Each grantee may apply for a COLA increase of 1.22% of the FY 2020 base funding level. Base funding excludes training and technical assistance funds and any one-time funding received during FY 2020.

COVID-19 Supplemental Funding - Each grantee may apply for a proportionate amount of the \$250 million based on their total funded enrollment. The purpose of these supplemental funds is the same as that of the CARES Act funds: to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19. within these parameters, grantees have flexibility to determine which investments best support the needs of children and families while adhering to state and local guidance.

What This Means for SETA - SETA, along with its delegate agencies and partners, will submit a funding application for the Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) and COVID-19 supplemental funding. The use of COLA funds may be a negotiated item for agencies/districts with a labor union. COVID-19 supplemental funds will be allocated to each agency based on funded enrollment. Both funding applications will likely be submitted with the May 1st annual refunding application. Funds will be available on August 1, 2021.

UPDATE FROM THE CDE/EARLY LEARNING AND CARE DIVISION

Email notification dated February 17, 2021 Stipend Allocation for Direct Service and Alternative Payment Contractors

In anticipation of legislation authorizing the CDE to allocate funding from the federal Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021 and Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act, the CDE is preparing to issue a one-time stipend in the amount of \$525 per subsidized child enrolled in a Direct Service or Alternative Payment Program.

These stipends are to address costs associated with the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic, in the case of decreased enrollment or closures, and to ensure that programs are able to remain open or reopen. This communication serves to notify CDE Direct Service Programs that Child Development Management Information System (CDMIS) CDD-801A enrollment data submitted for November 2020, will be utilized to determine the number of eligible subsidized children in the program for purposes of stipend allocations. The CDE requests that all direct service and alternative payment contractors review their data submissions for November 2020 to ensure the accuracy of the information that has been provided. Additional guidance will be provided to contractors in the coming weeks.

What This Means for SETA – SETA anticipates these supplemental funds to help cover costs associated with re-opening centers and serving in-person services during the program year.

Master Plan for Early Learning and Care - Making California for All Kids

(This is a partial summary of the full Master Plan. For full details, please visit https://www.chhs.ca.gov/home/master-plan-for-early-learning-and-care/)

In December 2020, California published a Master Plan for early care and education outlining a roadmap to ensure all children, 8 years old and younger, have equal access to high quality childcare and support services.

From the Preamble: "When Governor Gavin Newsom took office in 2019, he challenged California to provide all children with a great start by making comprehensive improvements to the state's early learning and care system for young children from birth through age five.

His challenge built upon existing research and recommendations, including those made by the Assembly Blue Ribbon Commission, the Lifting Children Out of Poverty Task Force, California's Transforming the Workforce for Children Birth Through Age 8, and the Rate Reform Work Group."

Goals Outlined in the Plan:

- 1 Unify and Strengthen Programs and Services to Support Children's Learning and Development
 - Expand Equitable Access to paid Family Leave
 - Strengthen Learning and Care Opportunities for Infants, Toddlers and Other Young Children
 - Provide California's Three-and-Four-Year-Olds with Access to a High-Quality Preschool Experience

ITEM VI - REPORTS TO THE BOARD

A. <u>CHAIR'S REPORT</u>: The Chair of the SETA Governing Board, on a regular basis, receives numerous items of information concerning employment and training legislation, current programs, agency activities, and miscellaneous articles about human service programs throughout the nation, and attends meetings pertinent to SETA business.

The important information from the material received and meetings attended will be shared with the entire Board and the method proposed by the Chair is to give a verbal report at each regular meeting. It will also allow time for the Board to provide input on items that may require future action.

B. <u>EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT</u>: This item is set aside to allow the SETA Executive Director to report to the Board on any items of important information or to deal with special requests which need to be addressed but, because of time constraints, were not included in the formal SETA Governing Board Packet.

The Executive Director's Report also allows the opportunity for the SETA Executive Director to apprise the Board of upcoming events, significant agency activities, or conferences.

- C. <u>DEPUTY DIRECTORS REPORT:</u> This item is set aside to allow the Deputy Directors to report to the Board any items relative to the program operations.
- D. <u>COUNSEL REPORT</u>: The SETA Legal Counsel is the firm of Gregory D. Thatch, Attorney at Law. This item provides the opportunity for Agency Counsel to provide the SETA Governing Board with an oral or written report on legal activities
- E. <u>MEMBERS OF THE BOARD</u>: This item provides the opportunity for SETA Governing Board members to raise any items for consideration not covered under the formal agenda. It also provides the opportunity for Board members to request or to ask that certain items be placed on the next Governing Board agenda.
- F. <u>PUBLIC PARTICIPATION</u>: Participation of the general public at SETA Governing Board meetings is encouraged. The SETA Governing Board has decided to incorporate participants of the audience as part of its agenda for all meetings. Members of the audience are asked to address their requests to the Chairperson, if they wish to speak.
