#### ITEM III- A- ACTION

## APPROVAL OF COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT (CSBG) FUNDING RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROGRAM YEAR 2020

### **BACKGROUND:**

On August 2, 2019, SETA released a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the CSBG program for program year 2020. The RFP solicited services under the Safety-Net, Youth and Senior Support, and Family Self-Sufficiency categories as identified in the 2020-2021 CSBG Community Action Plan. The amount of funding available for program services was estimated to be \$845,000, of which 39% was allocated to Safety-Net or short-term emergency services, 39% allocated to case-managed Family Self-Sufficiency services, and 22% allocated to Youth and Senior Support services.

The RFP included a special project to prevent or eliminate recidivism of felony or misdemeanor arrests in Sacramento County among African American youth 14-17. The successful proposals were eligible to receive up to \$40,000 under this service category. Success measures under this service area will include the number of project participants without a recidivating event during 180 days of project participation.

The deadline for receipt of proposals was September 12, 2019. Thirty-two (32) proposals were received by the 5:00 p.m. deadline, requesting a total of \$1,284,901. All thirty-two (32) proposals were evaluated. One additional proposal was submitted by email after the 5:00 p.m. deadline and was not evaluated, per the RFP instructions.

#### **Evaluation Process:**

All proposals received through this solicitation went through a comprehensive review process to provide funding recommendations to the Community Action Board. Staff recommendations were developed through the deliberations of a team of ten (10) readers representing SETA's Workforce Development and Fiscal Departments, Contracts unit, and Head Start Department, in addition to one member from the Department of Human Assistance. The readers evaluated, scored and ranked each proposal using standardized evaluation and scoring criteria that were identified in the RFP. Proposals were scored and ranked into four categories based on their numerical score.

The top ranked proposals achieved their scores based on the following criteria:

- The proposing agency had a history of successfully operating the proposed program or a similar program, had sufficient leveraged funding, and demonstrated the establishment of collaborative partnerships.
- ➤ The proposing agency adhered to the service priorities set forth in SETA's 2020-2021 Community Action Plan.

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- ➤ The proposing agency succeeded in achieving planned, contracted goals; or, if not previously funded by CSBG, the agency demonstrated a potential for success.
- The proposing agency demonstrated a need exists for the service.
- ➤ If applying for the Family Self-Sufficiency category, the proposing agency had a clear description of a case-management system and had a connection with the system of Sacramento Works America's Job Centers.

Staff also considered that all identified high-risk and underserved neighborhoods would have access to services and ensured that all identified target groups would be served. Due to limited availability of CSBG funding, only twenty-two proposals are being recommended for funding.

Three new agencies, Rose Family Creative Empowerment, Women's Empowerment, and Elk Grove Adult & Continuing Education are recommended for funding.

The 11 successful Safety-Net proposals are recommended with the stipulation that at

The 11 successful Safety-Net proposals are recommended with the stipulation that at least 70% of awarded funding be allocated for direct participant support services. As required in the RFP, Family Self-Sufficiency proposals are required to allocate a minimum of 15% of the awarded funding for direct participant support services.

All funding recommendations are made contingent upon successful agency status and performance by the end of calendar year 2019.

Attached are the resulting proposal rankings and staff funding recommendations. Proposal summaries and funding rationale will be submitted under separate cover.

The SETA Governing Board will consider CAB funding recommendations at its December 5, 2019 meeting.

## 2020 COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT PROPOSAL SUMMARIES

Proposal Number	Proposer Organization
1	Elk Grove Food Bank (EGFBS) (Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$34,870 to provide 625 households with food at the Dino Drive facility, and to fund mobile pantries to deliver food to seniors and the medically fragile, workshops on healthy eating and budgeting, and assistance with transportation to the food bank and other resources. Direct client resources comprise 66% of requested funding.
	Staff recommends \$20,000 in funding for this proposal. EGFBS is the only food bank serving Elk Grove and the surrounding areas, and provides a wide array of safety-net and self-sufficiency related services to homeless and low-income households of Sacramento County. EGFBS has consistently met SETA contract goals in the past.
2	International Rescue Committee (The IRC) (Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$31,000 to provide 115 low-income households with limited-time emergency assistance that includes transportation assistance, utility assistance, rental assistance, and employment supports. Direct client resources comprise 64% of requested funding.
	Staff recommends \$31,000 in funding to provide emergency assistance to low-income residents of Sacramento County, with a special emphasis on refugees and other immigrants. With 30 years of experience administering grants in Sacramento, the IRC helps thousands of low-income families each year to become resettled in the United States.
3	International Rescue Committee (Self-Sufficiency)
	Proposer requests \$85,000 to assist 75 economically disadvantaged households (including 40 carryover clients) overcome significant barriers to employment through STEPS (Stabilize, Train, Employ, and Progress to Success), with a focus on low-income refugee and immigrant populations and women with children aged 0-5 years. <b>Proposed</b>

	support services comprise 18% of IRC's funding request.
	Staff recommends \$65,001 in funding for this proposal. The IRC described an established employment program with an excellent track record, citing a 60% success rate in enrolled households reaching self-sufficiency and employment within six months of enrollment.
4	The Salvation Army (TSA) (Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$75,000 to provide 316 families with utility assistance, off-site shelter, eviction avoidance, and first month rental assistance at TSA's Family Services' eight (8) sites and collaborative partner locations throughout Sacramento County, including North Sacramento, North Highlands, Urban League, downtown Sacramento, Oak Park, Citrus Heights, Florin and Arden Arcade. In addition, TSA proposes to provide in-home visits for service provision to senior and disabled seniors who cannot come to a Salvation Army location, and intends to allocate 30% of its emergency services to seniors. Direct client resources comprise 75% of the requested funding.
	Staff recommends \$60,500 in funding for this proposal. The Salvation Army has a long history of providing the proposed services to SETA target groups in PY 2020 RFP priority areas throughout Sacramento County.
5	Volunteers of America
	(Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$27,870 to provide 226 homeless and imminently homeless veteran households enrolled in the Volunteers of America's Support Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) program with food, utility assistance and reconnection, off-site emergency shelter, eviction avoidance, first month rent assistance, and transportation assistance. Direct client resources comprise 100% of requested funding.
	Staff recommends \$27,870 in funding for this proposal, with the stipulation that eligibility for CSBG services be determined by SETA standards instead of the "30% of Area Median Income" standard noted in their proposal. VOA's proposed service delivery system is leveraged through collaborations with program partners, allowing all CSBG resources proposed to directly assist homeless and imminently homeless veterans in need and their families.
6	South County Services (SCS)
	(Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$100,000 to provide 621 households with food, transportation assistance, eviction avoidance, hygiene supplies and utility assistance and reconnection.

Proposer also requests funding to provide non-emergency resources and cover personnel costs included in other PY2020 RFP funding categories, requiring the creation and maintenance of case files by an identified case manager. Direct client resources comprise 30% of the requested funding. Staff recommends \$27,768 in funding for this proposal to fund emergency support services to low-income residents living primarily in the Galt and River Delta area. All other proposed staffing and services (translation services, immigration services, referral services, assistance with benefits applications, and eye exams) are considered ineligible for this funding category; they constitute non-emergency, case managed services and activities described in other PY 2020 RFP funding categories, and for which SCS did not apply. 7 My Sister's House (Safety Net) Proposer requests \$34,100 to provide 50 low-income and homeless survivors of domestic violence with utility assistance and reconnection, eviction avoidance, and first month rent assistance. Direct client resources comprise 66% of requested funding. Staff recommends \$34,100 in funding for this proposal. My Sister's House has a strong history of providing outreach, services, and a safe haven to domestic violence survivors, including Asian and Pacific Islander women, and their children. This funding category is intended to fund emergency services, with a limited amount of funding for administrative costs, and is intended to maximize direct expenditures in the community. 8 Waking the Village (WTV) (Self Sufficiency) Proposer requests \$85,000 to provide 24 homeless pregnant and parenting youth and their children with housing, case management, and support for the purpose of stabilizing households. The youth are connected with Sacramento Works Job Centers, education at the secondary or post-secondary level, mental and physical health care, parenting workshops, and other services as needed by the individual. Family services include free licensed child care or connection to Early Head Start. As required in this funding type, this request includes 15% of proposed funding as direct participant services, to be used for meals prepared on-site and served at Tubman House. Staff does not recommend funding for this proposal due to insufficient funding available in this service category.

9	Waking the Village (WTV) (Youth and Senior Supports)
	Proposer requests \$60,000 to work with 75 homeless youth at the Creation District (CD), an arts and workshop program which targets the homeless youth who are most resistant to services. The CD offers daily studio art and music space, over 250 workshops and community events per year, and an arts van that outreaches to the hardest-to-reach youth. The CD functions as a way to engage youth and build trust while awaiting more permanent services.
	Staff recommends \$40,000 in funding for this proposal. WTV maintains a high success rate in working with homeless households, and the CD has contributed to that success by establishing relationships with homeless, at-risk youth who are not yet ready or able to commit to housing, a job, or the other attributes of self-sufficiency.
10	Bach Viet Association
	(Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$36,500 to provide 300 low-income households in the Arden Arcade, Lemon Hill and Florin area with emergency food assistance and referrals to other services. Direct client resources comprise 27% of requested funding.
	Staff does not recommend funding for this proposal due to insufficient funding available in this service category.
11	Folsom Cordova Community Partnership (FCCP) (Self Sufficiency)
	Proposer requests \$64,563 to provide 30 single parent families with children 0-5, homeless or imminently homeless families with case management services and a full array of CSBG resources, to help families more fully engage in employment and training resources available through the SETA Sacramento Works America's Job Centers of California (SWAJCC) system. Direct participant costs, for a wide array of support services, comprise 16% consistent with requirements of this funding category.
	Staff recommends \$64,563 in funding for this proposal. This program is proposed to be co-located at a SWAJCC job center, with trained staff who have a strong history of guiding hard-to-serve populations to employment and self-sufficiency.

12	Wake-Up Foundation
	(Youth and Senior Supports)
	Proposer requests \$184,000 to provide 60 Asian-American youth and young adults aged 16-24, with education and career counseling, self-care resources, life skills training and mentoring.
	Wake-Up Foundation's proposal score was not high enough to recommend a CSBG funding award.
13	Elk Grove Adult and Community Education (EGACE) (Safety Net)
	Proposer requests \$38,342 to provide 161 single-parent, low-income or homeless households in the Florin, Lemon Hill, and Elk Grove zip codes with emergency supports including hygiene kits, food vouchers, transportation vouchers, utility assistance/reconnection, eviction avoidance, case management and access to EGACE's clothing closet. Direct client resources comprise 38% of requested funding.
