II. Consent Item

A. Approval of Minutes of the August 12, 2020 Regular Meeting

III. Action/Discussion Item

A. Approval of Staff Funding Recommendation for the 2020 CARES Act CSBG Supplemental Funding

Ms. Davis-Jaffe reminded the board that if anyone has a conflict of interest, they need to disclose the conflict and abstain from discussion and voting.

Ms. Davis-Jaffe reported that 27 proposals were received in response to the RFP. After the release of the RFP, staff was notified that we would receive additional discretionary funding. The added funding was allocated to World Relief.

Staff is requesting approval of the staff funding recommendations for CARES Act supplemental funding. These funding recommendations will go before the Governing Board on 10/29 for approval.

Ms. Dozier stated that a couple of proposals (Sacramento Kindness Campaign and World Relief Sacramento) talk about off-site shelter; what does that mean? Ms. Moore replied that this funds motel stays. Ms. Davis-Jaffe stated that the agencies need to be seeking other funds before using CSBG funds so there should be some coordination in the community. These funds help people to become stable in a hotel/motel and then move into stable housing.

Mr. Garcia asked about safety net services, there are three agencies that support the refugee community totaling \$150,000. Is there any reason to be concerned that there will be a duplication of services? Ms. Davis-Jaffe replied that the service providers communicate among themselves and she feels confident each service will be unique. This is throughout our funded programs to see if there are connections to make sure there is not a duplication of services.

Mr. Garcia noticed that the service providers at the top of the family selfsufficiency chart have higher costs per number serviced. Is it because of case management? Ms. Davis-Jaffe replied that it was; we require a minimum of 15% go to direct participant costs and these are case managed services. The contract would be for 17 months.

Mr. Starks stated that he is fine with the staff recommendations. However, he comes back to making sure the funding goes to where the need is; black and brown poor communities. He sees one organization that provides services for the black community. He would have liked to see more organizations serving the brown community; the common factor is poverty. He knows there are providers that serve these areas but he does not know if an organization located in an area is effective with a certain demographic. While the funding may be equal and degrees of equity, it struggles from diversity and inclusion. How do we get around the systemic issue? We have to start thinking about partnerships; partner

resources with organizations with credibility but do not have the credentials. It may be good to keep it on our minds so we do not always fund 'usual' service providers. People have a tendency to do 'lazy giving;' to always turn to the same person because they have a history with them. There needs to be staff working in the organization that reflects the community.

Mr. Garcia suggested the idea of interpretation/translation services; that is a sign that a provider is providing services to the brown and poor community. The River Delta area is often forgotten about in funding but they struggle with competing because they do not meet the minimum standards or do not speak English. It is important to see where the gaps are and keep them in mind for future funding opportunities.

Ms. Sass stated that she is listening to a book 'How to be an Anti-Racist' and is trying to figure out how to transform her organization and transform the community. All of the comments presented are good points; we need to figure out how do we get people to the table to actually help them?

Ms. Dozier has two questions on the part of the criteria for organizations dealing with systemic racism: 1) how are we able to evaluate it since it is a very short amount of time, and 2) how do we build into our process for funding that translates to a criteria for evaluating organizations?

Ms. Davis-Jaffe replied that in January, a conference was set up on how to make our community better and how to better work together. Unfortunately, COVID-19 came and we were not able to coordinate these meetings due to the need in the community. It is something that we now need to consider doing via Zoom. It is important to engage with our providers to ensure they're not just giving out money; they need to help people to make their lives better. The Zoom meeting would be open to all CAB members.

Mr. Garcia recognizes that staff is doing a great job and supporting the board. It is important to push to make change.

Ms.Davis-Jaffe mentionedan example of success funded under WIOA is the Pro Youth - Pivot Sacramento partnership, who have partnered to become a new Sacramento Works America's Job Center; with this funding, Pivot is funded under Family Self-sufficiency. Staff is working to reach out to smaller entities.

Mr. Starks suggested that with future RFPs the services be framed but not restricted; it is better for organizations to use funds unfettered. The language in the RFP should guide the board's giving.

They can provide providing rental assistance up to \$4,000 for rent in arrears or going forward.

Ms. Sass reminded people to vote; 26 of the 28 local library branches are ballot drop-off sites and there are 11 vote centers.

ITEM III- A - ACTION

APPROVAL OF COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT DELEGATE AGENCY FUNDING EXTENSION RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PROGRAM YEAR 2021

BACKGROUND:

SETA's delegate agreements with Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funded program operators permit SETA to extend the agreements for an additional year, ending on December 31, 2021.

SETA's estimated planning allocation for Program Year (PY) 2021 is \$1,821,879. After setting aside funds for program staffing, direct customer supports and administrative costs, staff recommends allocating \$999,000 for CSBG direct services by contracted partners.

SETA's Community Services and Fiscal staff have conducted a thorough evaluation of CSBG program operator performance through September 30, 2020. Staff have determined that the majority of CSBG program operators are performing in a satisfactory manner, and some have exceeded outcome goals and/or service levels prescribed in their subcontracts. Due to the impact of COVID-19 on current year's performance, staff is recommending extending all service providers agreements for an additional year at the same funding levels.

The SETA Governing Board will consider this recommendation at its December 3, 2020, meeting.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the extension of CSBG delegate agreements, as noted on the attached table, for an additional year under the same terms, conditions, and funding amounts, with the following stipulation:

Staff recommendations are contingent upon continuing levels of program performance throughout the 4th quarter of PY2020.
