The meeting was called to order at 9:01 a.m. The roll was called and a quorum was established.

II. ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS:

- A. Approval of an Appointment to the Sacramento Works Board
- B. Approval of an Appointment to the Sacramento Works Executive Committee

Mr. Kim reviewed items A and B. He advised that historically, the Sacramento Works Executive Committee has recommended individual applicants' names for appointment to the Sacramento Works Board's Business sector seats by the SETA Governing Board. The May 9, 2024, Executive Committee meeting did not occur due to the inability to attain a quorum. Therefore, item A was brought directly to the Sacramento Works Board. Ms. Kim Gusman, California Employers Association President/CEO, has submitted an application to fill a Business sector seat and is recommended for appointment by the SETA Governing Board.

Additionally, SETA's Executive Director has served as a Board member on the Sacramento Works Board and its Executive Committee in the "Other" member category. Ms. Anita Maldonado, SETA's Executive Director, was recently appointed to the Board and is being recommended for appointment to the Executive Committee.

Motioned/Clawson, second/ Bethke, to recommend to fill the Business sector seat to the SETA Governing Board, and to approve the appointment of Ms. Anita Maldonado, SETA's Executive Director, to the Sacramento Works Executive Committee.

C. Approval of the Funding Extension Recommendations for the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), Title I, Youth Program, PY 2024-2025

Ms. Mechals advised that, based on monitoring and performance reviews, SETA recommends that all youth services providers receive their level funding and that the providers that achieved 85% of their enrollment goal be funded for additional enrollment slots.

The total youth funding recommendation is \$2,666,089, contingent upon receiving the final WIOA allocation. Additionally, the recommendation includes funding to support the "Youth Voice" Youth Committee initiative in the amount of \$50,000.

Motioned/Clawson, second/Valenton, to approve the funding extension recommendations for the WIOA Title I, Youth Program, PY 2024-2025, with the stipulation that all funding recommendations are contingent upon satisfactory year-end program performance and final WIOA funding allocations.

D. Approval of WIOA Resource Allocation Plan, PY 2024-2025

Mr. Kim advised that on an annual basis, Sacramento Works, Inc. (SWI) reviews the RAP and approves the funds allocated to activities and services that assist unemployed and underemployed individuals within the Sacramento Works Job Center (SWJC) System for the next fiscal year. The RAP then goes for approval by the SETA Governing Board.

Mr. Kim reported that a bill titled "A Stronger Workforce for America Act", which would reauthorize the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), passed the U.S. House of Representatives in early April and is under consideration by the U.S. Senate. This bill would require a minimum of 50 percent of funds be allocated to provide training services, including employer-directed skills development and on-the-job training. SETA received the WIOA allocations for PY 2024-2025, which increased by about \$274,000. In anticipation of new legislation, staff recommends an increase in the amount allocated to training services of \$561,432.

Mr. Nye pointed out that during the last Planning/Oversight Committee meeting, he found it intriguing that there appears to be a discrepancy in the definition of career and training services between federal and state. He suggested that it would be beneficial to explore this matter in the future. He agreed with Mr. Kim that this RAP positions SETA well should the legislation pass the U.S. Senate. He also confirmed that the proposed changes would not result in any layoffs.

Mr. Kim advised that the summary of different training services and the summary of the "A Stronger Workforce for America Act" were attached to the item.

Ms. Smith expressed gratitude to the Board members for their achievements in implementing many of the items from the Action Plan.

Mr. Gordon proposed the inclusion of two Youth Voice members (aged 16-24) to the Board.

Following a discussion on integrating Youth Voice into the Board, Ms. Smith, utilizing her executive authority, referred this matter to the Planning/Oversight Committee for further examination and subsequent reporting back to the Board.

F. Board Members Engagement on Committees, Committee Structure and Chair Assignments

Ms. Smith encouraged the Board members to visit different committee meetings and consider joining at least one. She also asked members to provide referrals for private business seat candidates.

Mr. Kim stated that two new members, in addition to Kim Gusman, will be appointed at the next Governing Board meeting. They are Mr. Jeff Richard from the Employment Development Department and Ms. Sara Miles from the UFCW Western States Council.

Additionally, Ms. Smith urged members to take on the leadership role of the Committee Chair. The Board agreed that having terms and rotating Chairs is beneficial.

A. Dislocated Worker Report

Mr. Walker reported that Red Lobster has closed 87 of its locations, including the one on Howe Avenue in Sacramento. Additionally, he advised that SETA received a WARN notice from WellSpace Health stating that 24 locations would be closing, leading to 135 individuals being laid off.

B. Employer Recruitment Activity Report

Mr. Walker advised that SETA got a new client – the United States Credit Bureau assisted in hiring 20 collectors.

C. Unemployment Update/Press Release from the Employment Development Department: Ms. Welch reviewed the unemployment report provided in the packet. She added that the top growing industries in the Sacramento metropolitan area are private education and healthcare.

ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEM II-A

Approval to Transfer Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Dislocated Worker Funds to Adult Funds, Program Year (PY) 2024-2025, and Authorize Staff to Submit a Request to the State of California, Employment Development Department (EDD)

Presenter: Michelle O'Camb

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve the transfer of up to 100 percent, or \$3,500,291, in WIOA Dislocated Worker formula funds to the WIOA Adult formula funding stream for PY 2024-25, and authorize staff to submit a request to transfer the funds to the State of California, EDD. If approved, prior to submission to the State, this item will be presented for approval to SETA's Governing Board.

BACKGROUND:

This item addresses the transfer of Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Dislocated Worker funds to Adult funds for Program Year (PY) 2024-25. WIOA, signed into law July 22, 2014, allows Local Workforce Development Boards (LWDBs), with approval from the Governor, to transfer up to and including 100 percent of the funds allocated for Adult and Dislocated Worker programs in order to maximize customer service and provide local boards with greater flexibility to respond to changes in their local labor markets and the demonstrated needs of each unique population. WIOA funds transfer limitations can be found in WIOA, Section 133(b)(4).

Each year, eligible dislocated workers are served under SETA's adult funding stream. By alleviating staff and service providers of the labor-intensive eligibility, data collection, accounting and reporting procedures required when serving customers under the Dislocated Worker funding stream, more effort can be focused on education, training, and job development services.

Consistent with the State of California, Employment Development Department's (EDD) Workforce Services Directive WSD22-09, Transfer of Funds – Adult/Dislocated Worker Programs, issued on January 30, 2023, staff is recommending that the Board authorize the transfer of up to 100 percent of SETA's total WIOA Dislocated Worker formula allocation to the Adult program for PY 2024-25.

SETA's WIOA, Title I, Adult and Dislocated Worker formula allocations for PY 2024-25 are:

Adult - \$4,038,419 Dislocated Worker - \$3,500,291 \$7,538,710

The amount of Dislocated Worker funds to be transferred to the Adult allocation is anticipated to be up to \$3,500,291. Before facilitating the transfer, SETA will obtain written approval from EDD, Workforce Services Division, which has been delegated authority to act on behalf of the Governor.

The unemployment rate in the Sacramento--Roseville--Arden-Arcade MSA was 3.9 percent in May 2024, down from a revised 4.5 percent in April 2024, and above the year-ago estimate of 3.8 percent. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 4.5 percent for California and 3.7 percent for the nation during the same period. The unemployment rate was 3.7 percent in El Dorado County, 3.4 percent in Placer County, 4.0 percent in Sacramento County, and 4.2 percent in Yolo County.

Between April 2024 and May 2024, combined employment in the counties of El Dorado, Placer, Sacramento, and Yolo increased by 5,400 to total 1,108,300 jobs.

- Government (up 2,300 jobs) led the month-over job growth. State government (up 1,400 jobs) accounted for 61 percent of the growth. Local government added 900 jobs. Federal government reported no change.
- Employment in professional and business services increased by 1,100 jobs. Job gains occurred in administrative and support and waste services (up 1,300 jobs) and management of companies and enterprises (up 100 jobs). Professional, scientific, and technical services fell by 300 jobs.
- Over the month, construction payrolls rose by 1,000 jobs. Specialty trade contractors accounted for 70 percent of the job gain (up 700 jobs).
- Meanwhile, three industries reported employment declines: leisure and hospitality (down 600 jobs), manufacturing (down 100 jobs), and information (down 100 jobs).

Between May 2023 and May 2024, total jobs in the region increased by 24,000 or 2.2 percent.

- Private education and health services continued to lead the region in year-over gains with an increase of 14,900 jobs. Within the industry, healthcare and social assistance rose by 14,700 jobs, while private educational services added 200 jobs.
- Government employment grew by 7,500 jobs when compared to last May. Job growth was spread across local government (up 3,800 jobs), state government (up 3,600 jobs), and federal government (up 100 jobs).
- Construction employment reported an additional 2,300 jobs compared to a year ago.
- Year-over employment in professional and business services expanded by 2,200 jobs.
 Administrative and support and waste services (up 1,500 jobs) and professional, scientific, and technical services (up 1,200 jobs) were responsible for the expansion. These gains were offset by a decline of 500 jobs in management of companies and enterprises.
- On the downside, trade, transportation, and utilities (down 1,200 jobs) and manufacturing (down 1,200 jobs) recorded the largest year-over declines.



SACRAMENTO--ROSEVILLE--ARDEN-ARCADE METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL AREA (MSA) (El Dorado, Placer, Sacramento, and Yolo Counties)

The unemployment rate in the Sacramento--Roseville--Arden-Arcade MSA was 3.9 percent in May 2024, down from a revised 4.5 percent in April 2024, and above the year-ago estimate of 3.8 percent. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 4.5 percent for California and 3.7 percent for the nation during the same period. The unemployment rate was 3.7 percent in El Dorado County, 3.4 percent in Placer County, 4.0 percent in Sacramento County, and 4.2 percent in Yolo County.


